Research at the Family History Library, Salt Lake City Finnish Genealogical Society March 28, 2015

The Family History Library in Salt Lake City is the world's largest genealogical library. It can be overwhelming, but preparation will help make your research successful.

1. Collections:

microfilm, perhaps still the largest collection; may be ordered for local use books; do not circulate CDs and databases including free access to pay sites: Ancestry Arkiv Digital New England Historic Genealogical Society Fold3

newspapers and many more

2. FamilySearch website: https://familysearch.org/

a. Family History Research Wiki

The easiest way to find a Wiki is through search: Search > Wiki > <u>topic</u> The FHL Wiki describes the library: Search > Wiki > family history library hours, closures, parking schedule of free classes, week by week copy prices: $8 \frac{1}{2} \times 11$ b&w are 5 cents digital copies are free request "Granite Mountain Vault" films

Search the Wikis for: locality ethnic group topics such as census or probate

b. Catalog

Search > Catalog

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links to the Records on FamilySearch

Search by: Place, Surname, Title, Author, Subject, Keyword *Place* is often the most useful.
Don't include the words "state," "county," etc.
Do search on all geographic subdivisions: state, county, town, village, …
If digitized, follow red link to see the database.

Catalog answers 3 questions:

i. What's available at the library and what are the call numbers?
ii. What's been digitized and available on the web site? Digitized *Books* and *Records* can be searched separately, but *Catalog* encompasses both digitized and non-digitized. *Books* on this web site are awkward. New resources may be digital-only, i.e., not microfilm or book.
iii. Do you need to go to Salt Lake? Maybe not: The collection you need may be digitized on the web site.

You can order microfilm for \$7.50 per roll: Create a free account and sign in Find film number in Catalog Find the ordering information: Search > Wiki Type "order" in the search box Click "Ordering Microfilm or Microfiche" for instructions Choose a local LDS FHC or affiliate (there are 8 around the Twin Cities)

3. On-site at the Family History Library

Bring:

Thumb drive w/ lanyard or key fob, labeled with name and phone number A fanny pack is very useful Laptop or tablet; a lock can secure it to carrel Lists of film and book call numbers; helpful to include what you are looking for

Viewing and Copying:

For paper copies, buy a copy card from vending machine Cards with money on them can be saved and used on another trip Books:

Copiers can scan books to a thumb drive, or bring your scanner

Microfilm:

Try out different styles of microfilm reader for comfort Films must be removed from reader and taken to a central location for copies Microfilm copiers use ScanPro software to digitize the images for saving or printing; you will need help using it at first! You may print the images, or scan to your thumb drive

4. Survival

Salt Lake Plaza Hotel and family-style restaurant, in same block as library Microwave, coffee maker, refrigerator in rooms Complimentary airport pickup; call 801-521-0130 when you have your baggage Van can do limited transport around town Radisson Hotel, about 2 blocks away Large grocery about 4 long blocks from library Library has vending machines in a snack room (no coffee) No food allowed outside snack room except water in a closed bottle For dry climate and high altitude, bring water and lip balm Library has day-use lockers
